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Presentation of Mary

Mary's presentation was celebrated in Jerusalem in the sixth century. A church was built there in honor of this mystery. The Eastern

Church was more interested in the feast, but it does appear in the

West in the 11th century. Although the feast at times disappeared from the calendar, in the 16th century it became a feast of the universal Church.

As with Mary's birth, we read of Mary's presentation in the temple only in apocryphal literature. In what is recognized as an unhistorical account, the *Protoevangelium of James* tells us that Anna and Joachim offered Mary to God in the Temple when she was three years old. This was to carry out a promise made to God when Anna was still childless.

Though it cannot be proven historically, Mary's presentation has an important theological purpose. It continues the impact of the feasts of the Immaculate Conception (December 8) and of the birth of Mary (September 8). It emphasizes that the holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond.

It is sometimes difficult for modern Westerners to appreciate a feast like this. The Eastern Church, was quite open to this feast and even somewhat insistent about celebrating it. A Word From Father Thomas

Through he parable of 'Talents" Jesus teaches his followers a great lesson. The disciples are reminded that one day they too will have to give an account of life they received from God. God's grace and gifts can neither be wasted, nor can they remain static, nor be hidden. They have to be put to use for the purpose they have been given and should



bear fruits. What is evaluated at the coming of the master is not 'how much' a worker has made but how hard he has worked and how committed he was to the gifts given to him. In the parable, the first and the second servants doubled the amount they received. No doubt these two servants had to exercise considerable shrewdness and astuteness in investing the money. The third servant, showing no imagination or industry, took an easy path and hid the resources given to him. He was found lazy and unproductive and was fired from his job.

For us this parable communicated the message that each one of us is given a share in the mission of Christ. Our failure to live up to the call and produce fruits for the kingdom will invite punishment from God. Though the master does not specify how much we should produce, he does not compromise on anything less than the best from us.
