

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#### THE TRADITION OF THE BLESSING OF THE CHRISTMAS BAMBINO

III The Nativity scene, a beloved part of Christmas decorations the world over, can be traced to III the love for and devotion to Christ felt by St. Francis of Assisi. It should be recorded and held in reverent memory what St. Francis of Assisi did In the town of Greccio, on the feast day of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, three years before his glorious death. In that III town lived a certain man by the name of John (Messer Giovanni Velitta) who stood in high esteem, and whose life was even better than his reputation. Blessed Francis loved him with a special affection because, being very noble and much honored, he despised the nobility of III the flesh and strove after the nobility of the soul. Blessed Francis often saw this man. He now III III called him about two weeks before Christmas and said to him:

"If you desire that we should celebrate this year's Christmas together at Greccio, go quickly III and prepare what I tell you; for I want to enact the memory of the infant who was born at III Bethlehem, and how He was deprived of all the comforts babies enjoy; how He was bedded in the manger on hay, between an ass and an ox. For once I want to see all this with my own III eyes."

III When that good and faithful man had heard this, he departed quickly and prepared in the above-mentioned place everything that the Saint had told him. The joyful day approached. The brethren (Franciscan friars] were called from many communities. The men and women III of the neighborhood, as best they could, prepared candles and torches to brighten the night.

III Finally the Saint of God arrived, found everything prepared, saw it and rejoiced. The crib was made ready, hay was brought, the ox and ass were led to the spot.... Greccio became a new Bethlehem. The night was made radiant like the day, filling men and animals with joy. The III crowds drew near and rejoiced in the novelty of the celebration. Their voices resounded from the woods, and the rocky cliff echoed the jubilant outburst. As they sang in praise of God, the

whole night rang with exultation. The Saint of God III stood before the crib, overcome with devotion and wondrous joy. A solemn Mass was sung at the crib. The Saint, dressed in deacon's vestments, for a III deacon he was, sang the Gospel. Then he preached III a delightful sermon to the people who stood around him. And this is how a popular tradition was born!

The Lighting of the Fourth Candle: The candle of LOVE

Today we focus on the coming of the Son—the son of Mary, the Son of God! The angels announced the good news of a Savior. God sent his only son to earth to save us, because he loves us! "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." (John 3:16-17)



During the Advent Season, as we make our spiritual preparation for the birth of Christ, in addition to the regular schedule, the sacrament of Reconciliation will be available as follows:

- Any time during Adoration hours
   Tuesday mornings from 8:30AM-9:30AM
   Thursday evenings from 7PM-8PM.
- After morning Masses Monday and Friday
  - Any time by appointment

Last week when Deacon Jeff said in his sermon that 60% of the seniors in our Town are in need of food, I was really shocked. I spent the next days pondering over this.

Recently as you know I went to Rome to attend the canonization ceremony of our founder St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara. When he was the Apostolic Vicar for the St. Thomas Christians in our state, he gave the order to start schools with every parish. People raised funds, offered their time and talent and the schools were built. At that time, only the high cast people were allowed to study, but his order was to admit children from ALL casts. The lower cast people found it difficult because they had to send their kids to work in order to feed the family. St. Chavara, at that point asked Catholics to feed those children, because we are obligated by our Lord to "feed the hungry," quoting from St. Matthew (25:32-46). He proposed an easy method. In our state the main food of the people is rice. Every family will cook, rice at least twice a day. Each time when they take rice to cook, he



I thought we could do something similar in our situation. If every FAMILY set aside a quarter of a dollar a day from their food expenses, it would be a dollar and seventy-five cents a week (those who can afford it \$2 would be wonderful, and those who cannot \$1 a week or what you can afford). Bring it to church every Sunday or every month and we will use it to feed our needy people in Gibson City.

I ask you to think about this idea, share it with your friends and family members. If you think it is a good idea, express your ideas about how we can put this into practice. Some suggestions were to have something to remind us, like a container to keep the coins, etc., I look forward to hearing others. To begin, I think we need to make a pledge, so that it makes a FIRM commitment. The donations will go to the newly formed Gibson City Food Pantry. If this idea is acceptable, I will ask the Parish Council to think of ways to execute with the help of Deacon Jeff.

# Was Jesus actually born December 25?

How do we know the date of Jesus' birth? I've checked my Bible, and I can't find any mention of the date.

**You're right:** The Bible doesn't say Jesus was born December 25. The Gospels of Matthew and Luke are the only Scriptures to give much detail about Christ's birth and infancy. They name the key political figures of the day, but not much else (Luke 1:5 and 2:1–2). Neither evangelist included specific information about the dates.

Dates were apparently not important to the earliest Christians. Besides, the first few generations of Christ's followers were far more interested in celebrating Christ's resurrection each Sunday, and eventually on Easter, than they were in celebrating his birth.

ChristiansstartedtoassociateDecember25 with Christ's nativity centuries after the fact: the year 336, according to the earliest evidence.

The most popular theory is that the Church chose to replace a popular pagan Roman sun festival celebrating the winter solstice (December 21 or 22) with a Christian feast that could overtake the pagan festival and use its sun imagery to speak of Christ as the unconquered "Sun of Righteousness."

# December 21, 2014 FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

2 Sm 7:1–5, 8b–12, 14a, 16 / Rom 16:25–27 / Lk 1:26–38

In the whole of the New Testament, Mary appears only a handful of times. She is, of course, present at the birth of Jesus and at his death. She comes looking for her son in the temple when he's twelve and again when he's preaching. She lets him know that the time has come for his first miracle when he's in Cana.

She has more to say in this story of the annunciation than in any of the others, and in this one story we get more than a glimpse of the woman she would become in our memory—called on by millions, revered by all—an example of unparalleled obedience and openness to the movement of God in her life.

It strikes me that, along with being the mother of God (the Orthodox Church uses the word *theotokos*, which means "God-bearer"), Mary is our example of the best response to the presence of God. We let him in; we show God hospitality in our very being; we allow God to change our lives in ways we cannot even imagine yet.

The reality for most of us, though, is that in many times and places we *have* had the chance to welcome God in. Instead, we've shut God out because we thought something else was more important. Maybe it was power or wealth. Perhaps God was challenging us to move on a particular path, and we didn't want to.

Maybe our question for the week is, *what would* happen if I do as God asks?

With four days left before Christmas, let us practice saying yes to God—for in doing this, we honor the mother of us all.
