

October 18, 2015 Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

THE 15 PROMISES OF MARY TO CHRISTIANS WHO RECITE THE ROSARY

- 1. Whoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the Rosary shall receive signal graces.
- 2. I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the Rosary.
- 3. The Rosary shall be a powerful armor against Hell; it will destroy vice, decrease sin and defeat heresies.
- 4. It will cause virtue and good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities and will lift them to the desire of eternal things. Oh, that should would sanctify themselves by this means!
- 5. The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the Rosary shall not perish.
- 6. Whoever shall recite the Rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of its sacred Mysteries shall never be conquered by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice; he shall not perish by an unprovided death; if he be just, he shall remain in the grace of God and become worthy of eternal life.
- 7. Whoever shall have a true devotion for the Rosary shall not die without the Sacraments of the Church.
- 8. Those who are faithful to recite the Rosary shall have during their life and at their death the light of God and the plentitude of His graces; at the moment of death they shall participate in the merits of the Saints in Paradise.
- 9. I shall deliver from Purgatory those who have been devoted to the Rosary.
- 10. The faithful children of the Rosary shall merit a high degree of glory in Heaven.
- 11. You shall obtain all you ask of me by the recitation of the Rosary.
- 12. All those who propagate the Holy Rosary shall be aided by me in their necessities.
- 13. I have obtained from my Divine Son that all the advocates of the Rosary shall have for intercessors the entire celestial court during their life and at the hour of death.
- 14. All who recite the Rosary are my sons, and brothers of my only Son, Jesus Christ.
- 15. Devotion to my Rosary is a great sign of predestination.

Call the Rectory at least six months before. A six month preparation time is required. Question: What is a sacramental?


Answer: A sacramental is anything set apart or blessed by the Church to excite good thoughts and to increase devotion, and through these movements of the heart to remit venial sin.

What Kinds of Things Are Sacramentals?

The phrase "anything set apart or blessed by the Church" may lead one to think that sacramentals are always physical objects. Many of them are; some of the most common sacramentals include holy water, the rosary, crucifixes, medals and statues of saints, holy cards, and scapulars. But perhaps the most common sacramental is an action, rather than a physical object—namely, the Sign of the Cross.

So "set apart or blessed by the Church" means that the Church recommends the use of the action or item. In many cases, of course, physical items used as sacramentals are actually blessed, and it is common for Catholics, when they receive a new rosary or medal or scapular, to take it to their parish priest to ask him to bless it. The blessing signifies the use to which the item will be put—namely, that it will be used in the service of the worship of God.





The Word From Father Thomas

OCTOBER IS THE MONTH OF THE ROSARY

This month we will celebrate the month of the rosary with a special **ROSARY DEVOTION**.

We will begin this 10 day devotion on October 22 thru October 31. Father Thomas will be available for confession at 6PM each evening. The devotion will begin at 6:30PM with Mass, followed by Exposition of the Blessed sacrament, praying of the Rosary, and ending with the Benediction.

This 10 day devotion insures **plenary indulgence**, which is when a person must exclude all attachment to sin of any kind, even venial sin, must perform the work or say the prayer for which the indulgence is granted, and must also fulfill the three conditions of sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and praying for intentions of the Pope.

*Note the following exceptions

Sunday October 25, the devotion will NOT be in the evening, it will begin at 9:30AM with a LIVING Rosary of our RE children and ending with Mass. There will be coffee and doughnuts in the hall at 9AM for breakfast and fellowship until the service.

Saturday October 24 & October 31, the devotion service will start with confession at 4PM and Rosary at 4:30PM, followed by Mass.

Honoring Mary ____

God the Father honors Mary

God honors Mary by choosing her and allowing the fullness of divinity to take human form in Mary (see Lk 1:28-38).

Jesus Christ, the Son of God, honors Mary

Jesus intimates that Mary is truly great not only because she is his mother by human, physical ties but because she is an outstanding example of hearing the Word of God and keeping it — a true disciple (see Lk 8:19-21).

The first disciples honored Mary

Just as Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Mary, so the Church of Jesus Christ was born at Pentecost with Mary present (see Acts 1:14).

The early Christian Church honored Mary

Saint Luke honored Mary in his gospel stories of the Annunciation, Visitation, and birth of Jesus Christ. As early as 150 AD, in the catacombs of Rome, people painted pictures of Mary holding the baby Jesus.

We honor Mary

God's beautiful plan of redemption called upon the faith, hope, and love of Mary. Because she said yes, Christ was born and we are redeemed. It makes sense

that those who confess Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior also show honor and respect to his mother, Mary. And if we love Jesus Christ, we love Mary, his mother, because she gave him life and nurtured and cared for him until his public ministry began.



OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Our Lady of Lourdes CCD classes will be participating in this wonderful program again this year. Last year, several classes packed gift shoe boxes for children who may otherwise have had no Christmas. Our goal this year is to have each class participate by filling one box for a boy, and one box for a girl. The age range can be the same as the age of the students in that class. Please have each child bring one, unwrapped gift (\$5 or less), plus \$1 (to pay for the shipping of each box).

Since 1993, over 100 million boys and girls in over 130 countries have experienced God's love through the power of simple shoebox gifts from Operation Christmas child.

I know it seems early to be thinking about Christmas already, but the season will be upon us before we now it! National Collection Week will be November 16-23, 2015 this year. In the past couple of years, the Gibson City Bible Church has been an Operation Christmas Child Drop-off station, and our second grade class has taken a short trip there to drop off their boxes and see where they go from there. Are priests and religious the same?



The pastor of my parish recently asked us to pray for "priests and religious." Aren't they the same thing?

Some priests are religious, but not all religious are priests. As used here, the term "religious" refers to a member of a religious order—a man or woman who has professed vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience and who follows an approved rule of their religious congregation. Redemptorists, Sisters of Mercy, Franciscans, Jesuits, and Benedictines would all be examples. Members of a religious order can be sisters or brothers, but some religious men are priests as well. We call these religious men "Father." A priest who is not a religious is attached to a diocese and promises obedience to his bishop. He would be celibate but would not have a vow of poverty, so he would

receive a salary and could own his own house or car.

Behind your question is an important point. All priests are called to be "religious," holy men (in the spiritual sense) who bring us closer to Jesus by the celebration of sacraments, leadership, preaching, and the lives they live. In fact, all of the baptized are called to be holy; religious profession and priestly ordination are just two ways that Catholics live out their baptismal calling. The most common vocation is marriage, a sacrament alongside holy orders.
