## Our Lady of the Rosary

St. Pius V established this feast in 1573. The purpose was to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto—a victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church in 1716.

The development of the rosary has a long history. First, a practice developed of praying 150 Our Fathers in imitation of the 150 Psalms. Then there was a parallel practice of praying 150 Hail Marys. Soon a mystery of Jesus' life was attached to

each Hail Mary. Though Mary's giving the rosary to St. Dominic is recognized as a legend, the development of this prayer form owes much to the followers of St. Dominic. One of them, Alan de la Roche, was known as "the apostle of the rosary." He founded the first Confraternity of the Rosary in the 15th century. In the 16th century the rosary was developed to its present form—with the 15 mysteries (joyful, sorrowful and glorious). In 2002, Pope John Paul II added five Mysteries of Light to this devotion.

**THE PURPOSE OF THE ROSARY** is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of our salvation. Pius XII called it a compendium of the gospel. The main focus is on Jesus—his birth, life, death and resurrection. The Our Fathers remind us that Jesus' Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Marys remind us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. They also make us aware that Mary was and is intimately joined with her Son in all the mysteries of his earthly and heavenly existence. The Glory Bes remind us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Trinity.

The rosary appeals to many. It is simple. The constant repetition of words helps create an atmosphere in which to contemplate the mysteries of God. We sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of Jesus and Mary forever

"The rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christ-centered prayer. It has all the depth of the gospel messge in its entirety. It is an echo of the prayer of Mary, her perennial Magnificat for the work of the redemptive Incarnation which began in her virginal womb.... It can be said that the rosary is, in some sense, a prayer-commentary on the final chapter of the Vatican II Constitution *Lumen Gentium*, a chapter that discusses the wondrous presence of the Mother of God in the mystery of Christ and the Church" (Pope John Paul II, apostolic letter *The Rosary of the Virgin Mary*).

## OCTOBER IS THE MONTH OF THE ROSARY

This month we will celebrate the month of the rosary with a special **ROSARY DEVOTION**. We will begin this 10 day devotion on October 22 thru October 31. Father Thomas will be available for confession at 6PM each evening.

The devotion will begin at 6:30PM with Mass, followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, praying of the Rosary, and ending with the Benediction.

This 10 day devotion insures **plenary indulgence**, which is when a person must exclude all attachment to sin of any kind, even venial sin, must perform the work or say the prayer for which the indulgence is granted, and must also fulfill the three conditions of sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and praying for intentions of the Pope.

## \*Note the following exceptions

Sunday October 25, the devotion will NOT be in the evening, it will begin at 9:30AM with a LIVING Rosary of our RE children and ending with Mass. There will be coffee and doughnuts in the hall at 9AM for breakfast and fellowship until the service.

Saturday October 31, the devotion service will start with confession at 4PM and Rosary at 4:30PM, followed by Mass.

## **Good News!**

### October 4, 2015 TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (B) Gn 2:18-24 / Heb 2:9-11 / Mk 10:2-16 or 10:2-12

My mother was convinced that none of her children would get married. We were older when we were called to that vocation but, one by one, we did marry. I am happy to say that my husband and I continue to share this vocation three decades later, and we give our thanks to God. My sister was not as fortunate. After years of abuse, she divorced her husband. She did not make that decision lightly. She went into counseling, prayed, and talked. She considered her children, her husband, and herself. And she read and reread today's Gospel from Mark. In the end, her safety and the safety of her children was a major concern.

Jesus railed against the ease of divorce. A man had simply to hand his wife a piece of paper, and he could do so for any reason, including infertility and a failure to please him. But Jesus advances the woman's cause, refusing to allow her to be treated like a piece of property or disposed of at whim. He saw marriage as a sign of God's covenantal love and lifelong fidelity and exalts it as a sacrament. When both spouses commit themselves to each other and to their vocation, this grace is made manifest, and their bond is strengthened. But sin and human brokenness can interfere with God's plan, leaving separation or even divorce as the only option.

In the longer form of this reading, the people brought their children to Jesus, and he blessed them. Maybe we can do the same for those affected by abuse or divorce, so they too, at long last, can be healed.

## October 4, 2015 How should we deliver the Sign of Peace?

What is the etiquette for the Sign of Peace? I attend Mass alone and feel awkward as family members hug and kiss as though they haven't seen each other in years but ignore me even though I'm standing right next to them.

The Sign of Peace is a time to acknowledge Christ's presence in the congregation. It comes immediately before Communion. It is not time for shaking hands with someone you haven't seen for a while or for running around the church greeting everyone. It is time for wishing peace to one another before we receive the Eucharist as one body.

Remember Christ's words: "If you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you,...go first and be reconciled..." (Matthew 5:23–24). The Church's guidelines state, "in a sober manner, offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 82). They also say that local conferences of bishops should establish norms according to the customs of the people.

It is appropriate for a husband and wife to kiss each other, or for parents to kiss their children; in some places an embrace is also appropriate. The important thing is to remember that Christ is present in our midst and to acknowledge that presence in one another. If you feel excluded, I would suggest you let them know after Mass. You can simply say, "I felt left out."
