The Importance of Work Pope Francis I

With the celebration of Labor Day fresh in our minds, Pope Francis I shares his thoughts on The Importance of Work



uman labor is an important aspect of the dignity of the person. Likewise, there is

a need for creativity and solidarity to face the economic crisis that faces our world. Employment is necessary for society, for families and for individuals. Its primary value is the good of the human person, as it allows the individual to be fully realized as such, with his or her attitudes and intellectual, creative and manual capacities. Therefore, it follows that work has not only the economic objective of profit, but above all a purpose that regards man and his dignity. And if there is no work, this dignity is wounded! Indeed, the unemployed and underemployed risk being relegated to the margins of society, becoming victims of social exclusion.

What can we say, when faced with the very serious problem of unemployment that affects various nations? It is the consequence of an economic system that is no longer able to create work, because it has placed at its center the idol of money. Therefore, the various political, social and economic actors are called upon to promote a different approach, based on justice and solidarity, to ensure the possibility of dignified work for all. Work is an asset for all, and must be available to all. Phases of serious difficulties and unemployment must be faced with the tools of creativity and solidarity. The creativity of courageous businesspeople and craftspeople, who look to the future with trust and hope. And solidarity between all the elements of society, who all give something up, adopting a more sober lifestyle, to help those in need. This great challenge requires the involvement of the Christian community as a whole. The first challenge is to revive the roots of faith and of our adhesion to Jesus Christ. This is the inspiring principle in the choices of a Christian faith. Faith moves mountains! Christian faith is able to enrich society through the concrete element of the brotherhood it embodies.

Never cease to hope for a better future. Do not let yourselves be trapped in the vortex of pessimism! If everyone does his part, if we all put the human person and his dignity at the center, and if we consolidate an attitude of solidarity and fraternal sharing, inspired by the Gospel, we can emerge from the swamp of this difficult and burdensome period of economic turmoil.



It won't be long and Pope Francis will be here for his first ever visit to the United States. During his visit Pope Francis will highlight our faith's family foundations.

September 13, 2015 TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (B) Is 50:5–9a / Jas 2:14–18 / Mk 8:27–35

The undergraduate students with whom I work are part of a generation whose opportunities to serve others began in grade school. Regardless of religious affiliation, culture, or race, these students raised money, contributed to canned food drives, helped at food pantries, or built houses with their classmates or fellow club members. Now in college, they have hundreds of opportunities to help those less fortunate which are sponsored by this nonreligious institution alone, let alone the many more offered by their respective religious houses and communities. For the most part, they serve willingly, even eagerly. But I find that few of them sit down to reflect on the good work they do. They rarely consider the call to solidarity with the poor or the command of Christ to love one another. They just have a felt sense that they should.

For Catholics, as for all Christians, this felt sense has its roots in the faith we proclaim. If we truly believe that Christ is the Son of God and our Savior, our faith compels us to do what he did and to love as he loved. And it is more than that. Many people do service work because it's the right thing to do or because they want to give back. Those are good reasons. But we are called to be in a relationship of love with those we serve. We are challenged to see not only how we might serve them but to see the gifts they bring to us and how they shape our lives. We are called to accept them as our brothers and sisters.

September 13, 2015 "I have asked but have not received. Why?"

John 14:13 states, "Whatever you ask in my name, I will do...." Matthew 7:7 says, "Ask and it will be given to you." Well, I've been asking, and I haven't received. Did Jesus lie?

When reading sacred Scripture, it is always important to avoid interpreting the text too literally and to bear in mind the larger context of the passage. The purpose of both Gospel verses you mention is to remind us that God, our heavenly Father, is well aware of our wants and needs and abundantly generous at all times and in all things. However, as with any good parent, God also knows the difference between our wants and our truest, greatest needs. Most parents will not give their children everything they ask for simply because they say they want it, even when they ask nicely and say please.

Our requests of God may well reflect legitimate needs, but we must allow for the fact that God is not just considering our will in the request, but his will as well. We are all, after all, part of a plan that is much bigger than any individual person or need. So did Jesus lie? I assure you that he did not. God benefits from knowing the "big picture," from a complete knowledge and wisdom. By submitting ourselves in faith to this mystery, we benefit as well.
