

Call the Rectory at least four weeks before the baptism. Instruction for the parents and God-parents is required.



The Word From Father Thomas

We experience a...wonder whenever we are suddenly faced with something great, and even though it does not present any evil or danger to us, yet its magnitude and unexpected appearance awakens in us a certain rapture, amazement, and fear. Such a state will endure forever within the souls enjoying the sight of God.



There will be nothing unpleasant about it. Rather, it will be a motive for a deeper worship and love of God who, in spite of all his awe-inspiring greatness, will irresistibly attract them by his goodness and by the fullness of his mercy.

Filial fear is, therefore, something sublime and perfect, without any negative element in it...

It is evident that the sentiment of filial fear is the best protection against a light-minded approach to God's mercy and disrespect for the law of God...The more [filial fear] permeates the soul, the more the soul sees how much God in his wisdom and omnipotence condescends to it with his mercy...It is in contemplation of God's works that filial fear in our hearts should draw its daily food. Since the greatest among these is the Word Incarnate and his divine heart...it should become a center of all our filial fear, ever watchful that we do not wound but rather console and gladden it with our every act, with our every word, and with every beat of our hearts.

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY

St. Pius V established this feast in 1573 to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto—a victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church in 1716.

The development of the rosary has a long history. First, a practice developed of praying 150 Our Fathers in imitation of the 150 Psalms. Then there was a parallel practice of praying 150 Hail Marys. Soon a mystery of Jesus' life was attached to each Hail Mary. Though Mary's giving the rosary to St. Dominic is recognized



as a legend, the development of this prayer form owes much to the followers of St. Dominic. One of them, Alan de la Roche, was known as "the apostle of the rosary." He founded the first Confraternity of the Rosary in the fifteenth century. In the sixteenth century, the rosary was developed to include fifteen mysteries (joyful, sorrowful, and glorious). In 2002 Pope John Paul II added five luminous mysteries to this devotion.

The purpose of the rosary is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of our salvation. Pius XII called it a compendium of the gospel. The main focus is on Jesus—his birth, life, death, and resurrection. The Our Fathers remind us that Jesus' Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Marys remind us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. They also make us aware that Mary was and is intimately joined with her Son in all the mysteries of his earthly and heavenly existence. The Glorys remind us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Trinity.

The Rosary appeals to many. It is simple. The constant repetition of words helps create an atmosphere in which to contemplate the mysteries of God. We sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of Jesus and Mary forever.

QUOTE: "The rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christ-centered prayer. It has all the depth of the gospel message in its entirety. It is an echo of the prayer of Mary her perennial Magnificat for the work of the redemptive Incarnation which began in her virginal womb... It can be said that the rosary is, in some sense, a prayer-commentary on the final chapter of the Vatican II Constitution Lumen Gentium, a chapter that discusses the wondrous presence of the Mother of God in the mystery of Christ and the Church" (Pope John Paul II, The Rosary of the Virgin Mary).

Dear Padre

If we practiced devotions linked to an indulgence, but didn't know about it, are the benefits still attained?

"Every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death..." (CCC 1472). This "temporal punishment," often removed in purgatory, is distinct from "eternal punishment," from which we are saved through baptism and absolution.

Indulgences, which are granted through the mercy of God and the authority of the Church, remove all (if plenary) or part (if partial) of a person's temporal punishment for sin. Both presuppose the actions are performed with contrition and the intention of gaining the indulgence: "Although indulgences are in fact free gifts, nevertheless they are granted for the living as well as for the dead only on determined conditions. To acquire them, it is required on the one hand that prescribed works be performed, and on the other that the faithful have the necessary dispositions, that is to say, that they love God, detest sin, place their trust in the merits of Christ and believe firmly in the great assistance they derive from the Communion of Saints" (Pope Paul VI, Indulgentiarum Doctrina, 10).

So indulgences are not retroactive or automatic, but they in no way "diminish the value of other means of sanctification and purification, first and foremost among which are the Sacrifice of the Mass and the Sacraments, particularly the Sacrament of Penance" (*ID* 11).

Good News!

October 9, 2016 Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) 2 Kgs 5:14–17; 2 Tm 2:8–13; Lk 17:11–19

When my daughter was seven, she cut her thumb badly while trying to make a fruit salad. When she cried out for me, I quickly dressed her younger sister and we went to the hospital for stitches. She was in pain and crying when the doctor injected the anesthetic into the hand to numb the pain. With a firm, but quiet voice he looked at her and said, "Katy, does it still hurt?" She stopped all at once and said with a voice of wonder, "No." He proceeded to stitch up the thumb and congratulated her on being brave. She thanked him and then talked about him for the rest of the day. I still remember the surprised look when she finally realized her thumb no longer hurt. She didn't know that the anesthetic had taken effect because she expected to still be in pain.

The ten lepers who met Jesus knew they couldn't approach anyone and they had undoubtedly called out to others to help them. When Jesus told them to show themselves to the priests, they went their way not expecting to be cured and still deep in their isolation. Some inner voice made one leper suddenly aware that he had been made clean. He stopped, full of wonder. The priest would still have to inspect him before he could return to his community. but his desire to look at Jesus one more time and give thanks for his mercy had to come first. We don't know what made him so mindful of his healing, but his response inspires us. How has Jesus touched and healed you? How will you thank him, and who will you tell?
