

The Word From Father Thomas

Pope Francis declared the Year of Mercy and the Catholic Church welcomed it with great joy and enthusiasm. We all know that it started on 8th December on the Feast day of Immaculate conception 2015 and will end on 20th November 2016, the solemnity of the Jesus Christ the King of the Universe. Pope Francis encourages each one of us to do the corporate works of mercy and to receive the mercy of God, because God our Father is so merciful. We all might have done corporate works of mercy individually and/or collectively. The Pope encourages us also to receive the spiritual benefits of this Year of Mercy. Those who pass through the Holy Door of a pilgrim church and pray the creed and one our Father, one Hail Mary, and one Glory be to the Father for the intention of the Pope will receive a plenary indulgence. Earlier only the Basilicas of Rome had Holy Doors but it is not possible for the ordinary people all over the world to go to Rome. This time Pope announced that bishops can declare pilgrim churches in their dioceses with Holy Doors. For us it is the Immaculate Conception Church in Gilman that is a pilgrim church. To obtain plenary indulgence, one has to go for confession and go to a pilgrim church and pass through the Holy Door. It is enough that one goes to any church declared in any diocese. (An indulgence is defined as "the remission before God of the temporal punishment due for sins already forgiven as far as their guilt is concerned." The first thing to note is that forgiveness of a sin is separate from punishment for the sin. Through sacramental confession we obtain forgiveness, but we aren't let off the hook as far as punishment goes. Indulgences are two kinds: partial and plenary. A partial indulgence removes part of the temporal punishment due for sins. A plenary indulgence removes all of it.) I encourage everyone who has not yet made use of this great opportunity to do so before the Holy Year ends.

Are non-Catholics eligible to be named saints?

"The cause of beatification and canonization regards a Catholic who in life, in death and after death has enjoyed a reputation of holiness by living all the Christian virtues in an heroic manner" (Sanctorum Mater, 4.1). In this process, the Catholic Church not only investigates the heroic virtues of a candidate, but confirms miracles attributed to them after their death, and ultimately declares a person to be a saint in heaven and worthy of veneration.

Moreover, the process is ecclesial: it is executed by the Catholic Church for the holiness of its members. "By *canonizing* some of the faithful, i.e., by solemnly proclaiming that they practiced heroic virtue lived in fidelity to God's grace, the Church recognizes the power of the Spirit of holiness within her and sustains the hope of believers by proposing the saints to them as models and intercessors" (CCC 828).

While there are non-Catholic saints worthy of canonization, the Church does not presume to canonize members of other churches (should they even be presented for validation); rather, the Church favors candidates who are in the same full communion of faith as the Catholics whose understanding of saints look to them as intercessors. As Kenneth Woodward wrote in *Making Saints*, "Catholic saints make sense only within a world where the 'body of Christ' is more than just a metaphor."

Good News!

November 6, 2016 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) 2 Mc 7:1-2, 9-14, 2 Thes 2:16-3:5 Lk 20:27-38 or 20:27, 34-38

In his first letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul talks about life after death with the simple phrase, "we shall be changed" (15:51-52). In the Nicene Creed, we "look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." This is the hope of our faith: Even in death, our communion with God cannot be severed. But what will life after death be like? That's the question that the Sadducees had trouble answering. It's important to know that the concept of resurrection was a fairly recent development in Jesus' time. The idea was disputed. The Sadducees did not believe in resurrection: the Pharisees did. The Sadducees were trying to trip Jesus up with their question about multiple marriages. They clung to the notion that life after death would be exactly like life on earth. Thus, the practical issues would present insurmountable problems. Jesus was not fooled; he tells them that when God raises us up, we will come fully into our identities as children of God.

God has revealed much about life after death since then. We know we will stand before God when we die and face his judgment and mercy. We know we will be able to turn our backs on God (hell) or turn toward him (heaven). We know that for many, purification (purgatory) will be part of that process. Afterward, our loving union with God will remain eternally. Perhaps that truth will inspire greater faith, hope, and witness here and now.
