EXPLORING INDULGENCES WITH "PAT IN THE PEW"

This week we will hear about HOLINESS BEING MORE THAN MERE NICENESS! This is the third week in our exploration of the four principles to help you reconsider the gift of indulgences during the year of MERCY!

Trying to be a nice person is better than not trying to do so. But the cross of Christ reminds us that being nice isn't good enough. After all, if it were, then why did the Father have to see the Son be crucified? Why did Jesus need to endure such a brutal and humiliating death?

Holiness is our destiny. Sharing in the communion of persons that is the Blessed Trinity will require that we be perfect, as our heavenly Father is perfect. We can go to the sacrament of reconciliation, hear the words of Christ spoken to our hearts through the priest, and know that we have been returned to a state of grace. We would be ready to go home to God, even if we are not yet perfectly holy. Whether it be worldly attachments, petty vices, deep-rooted pride, don't most of us resist dying to self and allowing Christ to live in us?

In addition, don't we all have family members and friends who weren't "perfectly holy" when they died? We are rightly filled with hope that they have been saved, not because of their worthiness, but because of Christ's death and resurrection. Offering indulgences for them helps speed their way to perfect purity of heart and soul. This is Pope Francis' vision when he writes that "to gain an indulgence is to experience the holiness of the Church, who bestows upon all the fruits of Christ's redemption, so that God's love and forgiveness may extend everywhere" (MV, n.22)

St. Hilary of Arles

It's been said that youth is wasted on the young. In some ways, that was true for today's saint.

Born in France in the early fifth century, Hilary came from an aristocratic family. In the course of his education he encountered his relative, Honoratus, who encouraged the young man to join him in the monastic life. Hilary did so. He continued to follow in the footsteps of Honoratus as bishop. Hilary was only 29 when he was chosen bishop of Arles.

The new, youthful bishop undertook the role with confidence. He did manual labor to earn money for the poor. He sold sacred vessels to ransom captives. He became a magnificent orator. He traveled everywhere on foot, always wearing simple clothing.

That was the bright side. Hilary encountered difficulty in his relationships with other bishops over whom he had some jurisdiction. He unilaterally deposed one bishop. He selected another bishop to replace one who was very ill -but, to complicate matters, did not die! Pope St. Leo the Great kept Hilary a bishop but stripped him of some of his powers.

Hilary died at 49. He was a man of talent and piety who, in due time, had learned how to be a bishop.

Spiritual direction vs. advice

What is spiritual direction? How does it differ from counseling and simply asking for religious advice?

In spiritual direction, a person is guided in a process of reflection, self-discovery, and recognition of God's presence in human experience; the primary focus is on this individual's relationship with God. Thus, in one sense, it is the Lord himself who is the "director" in all spiritual direction.

In counseling, a person is also guided in a process of reflection and self-discovery; but the primary focus is on human growth and development. Counseling does not presuppose a person's faith or relationship with God; spiritual direction cannot be complete without it.

Both spiritual direction and counseling share the same expectations of openness and honesty in the process; they share the same standards of confidentiality and professional conduct. Moreover, spiritual direction is similar to counseling in its aim toward human growth and development; but it further aims toward holiness and "toward ever more intimate union with Christ" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 2014). That union is twofold: a personal relationship with Christ and one with Christ's Church. "This union is called 'mystical' because it participates in the mystery of Christ through the sacraments" (CCC 2014). "All Christians in any state or walk of life are called to the fullness of Christian life and to the perfection of charity. All are called to holiness: Be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (CCC 2013).

Good News!

May 1, 2016 SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER (C)

Acts 15:1–2, 22–29 / Rv 21:10–14, 22–23 / Jn 14:23–29

For many Catholics, Vatican Council II was a watershed moment in Church history. I remember the nuns in our school turning on the radio to listen to reports. They shared what Pope St. John XXIII said at the start of the council. The media still follow large Church events, but it's easy to forget that Church leaders have been gathering to talk about the issues of the day since the first century.

In the first reading, we hear (in fairly abbreviated form) about the Council of Jerusalem. The apostles and other leaders of the Church came together to discuss whether Gentiles had to be circumcised (a tenet of Jewish Law) before they were baptized. There were legitimate claims on both sides. Remarkably, the leaders prayed, talked, and prayed some more. They spoke from their experience and their faith. They assumed that all the assembled were people of faith, and so they wrestled together to find the answer most in keeping with the commands of Jesus.

In the end, when they decided to admit Gentiles without circumcising them, the whole community recognized that the Holy Spirit was at work, and the letter sent to the various churches began, "It is the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us..." The Council of Jerusalem gives us a model for resolving our differences: pray, dialogue, and pray some more. This week, read all of Acts 15 to see what happens when we trust the Spirit to guide us rightly: arguments fall silent, and we find delight, strength, and peace (see 15:12, 31–32; John 14:27).
