The Word From Father Thomas

WHAT IS THE SACRAMENTAL GRACE OF PENANCE?

When we sin, we cannot fix things up with God on our own. We know we have to be forgiven. But once we sin, we do not have it in us even to be sorry, and to ask rightly, humbly, reverently for forgiveness. Why not?

When we sin, we fall from charity; that is to say, we fall out of friendship with God. This friendship is purely God's gift to us in Christ. It puts us above ourselves. To sin is to step down, or fall down from charity. And then we can't reach high enough on our won to get back where we were. In an ordinary friendship, there is still something in common between us, even if only our humanity, if I offend my friend. I can say I am sorry and do ny part to put things back together. But when we lose charity, we don't have anything in common with God anymore. With charity, God is the very "commonality: of the relation—its beginning in Christ, its course in the Spirit, and its term in the vision of heaven.

Paradoxically, to ask for forgiveness from God rightly and fittingly, I have to ask from charity—the only thing there ever was in common between us. But I threw that away. And now I need it more than ever in order to be rightly sorry for having thrown it away. I may be regretful that I sinned and was so stupid. Feeling stupid is not an exercise of friendship. I may fear the justice of God because I sinned. Such fear is not from charity. I may dread the loss of heaven and fear the pains of hell. These things are self-regarding. The sorrow of heart, the contrition I now need is being sorry I have offended my Friend. Who is my friend only with charity. Which sin destroys.

What the sacrament is for is to jump-start things. I come to the sacrament self-wounded, self-centered, self-bound, but still with enough wit to know what I lost, longing once again to have the freedom of the house of God as a son, and not as a servant or slave. I confess my sins. I hear again the Gospel truth I scorned. I submit to judgment. I express my sorrow as best I can, aware of what real contrition before God would be. I hear the words of absolution. And these acts of penitent and priest God uses to produce in me some true breath of contrition, animated then and there by charity. That's the promise, the surety, of the sacrament: it permits me to speak in the sacramental moment as friend to Friend. The risen Lord could have asked Peter, "Are you sorry?" But what he asked in fact was "Do you love me?"

Dealing with Catholics who ignore Church beliefs

How should the Church respond to Catholics who publicly ignore its beliefs and morals?

Let's begin with Jesus' recipe for dealing with a person who is living in known sin (Matthew 18:15–17). First of all, gently bring instruction or correction in private. This is a simple, friendly call to repentance. If he or she does not listen, a second witness or authority may be called. We then may approach the pastor or another leader to try to help the person to reject the evil. If the person still refuses, the Church may be forced to exclude him or her from the Eucharist until there are signs of repentance. This is known as "excommunication" and is an extreme last resort. It is an ugly word for an ugly reality. It is a public proclamation by the Church that an individual is defiant in his or her rebellion and has left the community of the faithful.

Notice that excommunication is not the Church kicking out a poor sinner, but it simply proclaims that the person has chosen to leave our values for the sake of selfishness, politics, money, or some other motive. In fact, the whole reason for excommunication is to try to show the person the seriousness of his or her offense so that he or she will return to Christ and the Church and receive mercy.

June 12, 2016 **ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (C)**

2 Sm 12:7–10, 13 / Gal 2:16, 19–21 / Lk 7:36—8:3 or 7:36–50

When I was seven or eight, I stole a package of gum from the store. When my mother found out about it, she dropped what she was doing and made me take money from my piggy bank. We then drove back to the store where I had to bring my money to the cashier and confess that I had taken the gum. She thanked me for bringing the money and spoke those sweet words, "I forgive you." I never forgot the lesson, and I never stole anything again. If only that were the only sin I had to worry about!

Throughout our lives, we become increasingly aware of the many ways we fall short of the holiness to which God calls us. Male or female, ordained or lay, old or young, we often give in to what tempts us because it looks so good in the moment. Only later do we realize the harm we have done to ourselves or someone else. The woman with the jar of ointment knew only too well that her life was not perfect. But she also heard Jesus' invitation to repent and the love in his message. She laid her life and her service at his feet and knew the forgiveness of God. The Pharisee, on the other hand, could not imagine that he needed forgiveness and so was not open to the transformation that Jesus offered.

All of us sin and are in need of forgiveness. When we ask for and accept that forgiveness in our lives, we are able to give far more than we can imagine. Just ask Mary, Joanna, Susanna, and all the other women and men who followed Jesus.
