The Word From Father Thomas

MERCY AND THE UNFORGIVABLE SIN

GOD OFFERS US LIMITLESS MERCY. There is no offense, no wound, no darkness that God's mercy cannot forgive, heal, and illumine. As the

Psalmist says, He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor requite us according to our iniquities. For as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is his steadfast love toward those who fear him; as far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us (Ps 103:10-12). The divine mercy is never exhausted by those who seek it.

Even though God's mercy is boundless, Jesus nevertheless refers to an unforgivable sin (Mt. 12:31-32). This sin is unforgivable not because God is lacking in mercy but because, in his love for us, God gave us the freedom to refuse his love and reject his mercy. Jesus refers to this as sinning "against the Holy spirit." Commenting on Jesus' words, the Catechism teaches, "There are no limits to the mercy of God, but anyone who deliberately refuses to accept his mercy by repenting, rejects the forgiveness of his sins and the salvation offered by the Holy Spirit (cf. John Paul II, Dominum et vivificantem 46). Such hardness of heart can lead to final impenitence and eternal loss" (CCC 1864).

Thus the only thing that can be said to "limit" the mercy of God is a stony heart. When a person refuses to ask for God's mercy or avail himself of the sacraments instituted to effect forgiveness and reconciliation, he cuts himself off from the infinite stream of divine mercy flowing from the heart of Jesus. God will not force the proud heart to submit to the order of his wisdom and love.

In other words, as Pope Francis has said many times since his first Angelus address: "God never tires of forgiving us! The problem is that we ourselves tire, we do not want to ask, we grow weary of asking for forgiveness." We become hard-hearted and lose confidence in God's mercy.

The remedies to hardness in the human heart are lively faith and hope in the goodness of God. Christians must cling to the truth that the grace of Christ promised them in the Church and her sacraments is sufficient to heal them from every sin and renew them from within.

No bad habit or vicious activity, no moral flaw or sinful choice, can exhaust the love and mercy of the crucified and risen Christ. However, we must open the door to his mercy by avoiding hardness of heart, cultivating instead hearts of humble faith and confident hope.

Good News!

There have been a few times in my life when someone's actions have hurt me so badly that I hardly knew how to react. At those times, I have dealt with sadness, anger, and the desire for revenge. Reflecting back, I realize it takes me a long time to let go of hurt. My mind returns to the offense; I think about what I wanted to say. I want the person to acknowledge the hurt and to apologize, to admit I was right and she was wrong. Sometimes I feel I am caught in a trap of my own making. I want to be free of the hurt, but I don't want to let it go until I am satisfied.

was. I imagine they talked about it until Jesus, tired of hearing their complaints, rebuked them. Why did he do that? At least part of the answer comes in the passage that follows. Would-be followers of Jesus want to attend to something in their past life before they join him. Jesus reminds them of the futility of that by using an example that is immediately apparent to farmers. To plow a straight line, we have to look ahead and follow the one who leads us. If we turn our heads to look back, our line and our lives will go crooked. Clinging to past hurts makes it hard to look ahead. If we are to be disciples, we must learn to let go and forgive even as we are forgiven.

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Why Catholic VBS is best



I want to send my daughter to Vacation Bible School at a nearby Protestant church. My husband insists we send her to a Catholic VBS across town. It's five half-days of fun and games—does it matter whether it's Catholic?

While it's true that much of VBS is games, crafts, and snacks, it's best for Catholic children to go to Catholic VBS because Protestant VBS doesn't include Catholic content like sacraments, saints, and practices.

A solid Catholic VBS program integrates well with the standard religion curriculum. The Bible lessons should have an *imprimatur*, and verses should come from a Catholic version of the Bible. Look for *Catechism* citations to see the teachings the program supports. The theme—a camp, a treasure hunt, the beach—is important but not as important as the content.

If no nearby parishes are hosting VBS, encourage your parish to do it next year.

Many Catholic publishers (including Liguori) sell inexpensive starter kits with step-by-step instructions for planning and running a VBS as well as teacher materials, music, decorating ideas, and sample accessories. If parishioners donate art supplies, decorating materials, snacks, and prizes, the parish's overall cost is minimal.

A common challenge is finding enough volunteers. Sometimes several parishes pool their talent to offer one large VBS; others use teen or senior volunteers. If you do VBS right, you can engage your entire parish in teaching children about Jesus—and there's nothing more Catholic than that.
