# JULY 2, 2017 THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### Saint John of Avila's Story

Born in the Castile region of Spain, John was sent at the age of 14 to the University of Salamanca to study law. He later moved to Alcala, where he studied philosophy and theology before his ordination as a diocesan priest.



After John's parents died and left him as their sole heir to a considerable fortune, he distributed his money to the poor. In 1527, he traveled to Seville, hoping to become a missionary in Mexico. The archbishop of that city persuaded him to stay and spread the faith in Andalusia. During nine years of work there, he developed a reputation as an engaging preacher, a perceptive spiritual director, and a wise confessor.

Because John was not afraid to denounce vice in high places, he was investigated by the Inquisition but was cleared in 1533. He later worked in Cordoba and then in Granada, where he organized the University of Baeza, the first of several colleges run by diocesan priests who dedicated themselves to teaching and giving spiritual direction to young people.

He was friends with Saints Francis Borgia, Ignatius of Loyola, John of God, John of the Cross, Peter of Alcantara, and Teresa of Avila. John of Avila worked closely with members of the Society of Jesus and helped their growth within Spain and its colonies. John's mystical writings have been translated into several languages.

He was beatified in 1894, canonized in 1970, and declared a doctor of the Church on October 7, 2012.

# **The Word From Father Thomas**

#### THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THAT CUP OF COLD WATER



Instead of exalting the heart, the devil humiliates and discourages it to the point of driving it to despair. He recalls past sins, aggravating them as much as possible, so that the person, terrified and falling dismayed under such a heavy burden, is reduced to despair. So the devil acted with Judas. When

he was at the point of committing his sin, the devil removed its gravity from his sight; afterward, he brought to his mind the gravity of his crime in having sold his Master at so low a price and unto such a death. Thus, the devil blinded his eyes with the greatness of his sin and, having caught him in the snare, led him to hell (cf. Mt 27:3-5). So, he blinds some people by their good works. He places them before them and hides their sins from their sight, thus deceiving them with pride. He blinds others by hiding form them the memory of God's mercy and the good works they have performed by his grace. By then bringing their sins to mind, he pulls them down through despair.

The remedy for the first temptation would be that, when the devil would want to exalt us in vanity to the sky, we should cling fast to the earth, considering not our peacock feathers, but our feet covered with the mud of the sins we have committed—or would commit if it were not for God's grace. For the other deceit of the devil, the remedy is to turn our eyes away from our sins and to fix them on God's mercy and on the good things that we have done by his grace. For in the time when our sins fight against us through despair, it is good to recall the good things that we have done or that we do...

The purpose here is not to put confidence in our good works insofar as they are ours, for this would be to flee from one trap and fall into another. Rather, the purpose is to hope in the mercy of God, who has favored us so that, by his grace, we might do good. He will reward what we do, including even the cup of water that we have given for love of him.





# To Live With Christ

priest friend of mine visited a

family with several sons thinking about the priestly vocation. During his visit he celebrated Mass for them at the local parish. The Gospel reading was the same as today: "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me...." My friend thought twice before reading it, afraid that the father who wasn't open to his sons' vocations would think he picked this passage on purpose. He read it anyway and, yes, got the reaction he suspected he'd get.

Most words in the Gospels are challenging. Jesus calls us to love him above all things. This means he has to come first, and sometimes other loves, as good as they are, cannot be the ultimate criteria. He tells us to "lose our life" to find it, and sometimes that loss is real and painful.

He demands this because he himself experienced its truth. In his public ministry, he put his mission and love of souls ahead of spending more time with family and friends. When religious leaders, government officials, and others criticized and persecuted him, he didn't back down, even if it affected his loved ones. He was faithful in charity. He didn't look for problems, but he didn't run from them, either. He avoided unnecessary conflict when he could, but he completely obeyed God's will and embraced the hardships of loving until the end.

For Reflection How can I live my life as though nothing is more important than Jesus? Do I regularly witness to my love for Jesus, using words when necessary?

"...Whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me Is not worthy of me" (Matthew 10:37)

# DEAR PADRE,

If my fiancé and I abstain from sex, why can't we live together before we get married?



Lt seems to me there are two reasons living with your

future spouse before marriage is not a good idea.

One is that you are setting each other up for some serious temptations, or an "occasion of sin." It would be similar to putting a bottle of gin on the desk of an alcoholic or a carton of cigarettes in front of someone who has succeeded in giving up smoking. I'm not saying you have some sort of addiction, but the natural pull of sex is going to be particularly strong, especially when you're young, in love, and ready to commit to marriage.

You will be free and even encouraged in marriage to pursue the greatest intimacy. But for the moment, it is asking too much to put you both in the same circumstances now that you will be in after you wed.

The second reason for not living together before marriage is that the living situation could give scandal to others. If you are active in your church and vocal about practicing your Catholic faith but then start living with your future spouse before marriage, it can raise questions (and eyebrows) about what you really believe and how you're living your faith.

There may be some good-sounding reasons for living together. You can cut down on costs, get to know your future spouse better, and so on. But these reasons aren't worth the risk.

My advice is that you help each other live a virtuous life now, by sacrificing the convenience of living together outside of marriage, as the best practice for your life together in the sacrament of matrimony.
