FEBRUARY 11, 2018 SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Is a season in which e prepare for Easter, the high point of the Christian year. Over the centuries, Lent has become a special time for fasting, abstinence, communal and private prayer, self-discipline, serving others, study, reflection and penance, The whole Church re-examines its priorities, to leave sin and self-love behind and intensify our love and service of god and others.

This conversion requires changes both in our inner attitudes and our outer actions. Just as Jesus confronted the powers of evil that hld his world in their grasp, so we too must get involved in that struggle to eliminate evil's domination over us and our lives. Every day we must make the hard choice to eliminate evil ad bring good. If we each began to refuse to introduce any new evil and injustice into the world, then the kingdom of God that Jesus envisioned preached and died for would start right now to become a reality for ourselves and those around us. So this Lent let us take a look in the mirror each morning and tell ourselves that now, with God's help, "The evil stops here."

Lenten Regulations

• Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.




- All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or aility to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.
- Lent is the principal season of penance in the Church year. All of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial (in addition to following the Lenten regulations), serious prayer, and a performance of works of charity and mercy.

THE PERSEVERANCE OF THE LEPER

But even if we are not able to make as much progress as we like, we should not be discouraged on that account. This does not indicate that God would deny our pious expectation, but only that he wills to try our perseverance. Let us continue faithfully and courageously in our holy desires and good intentions, striving to increase them more and more, and leaving all else in God's hands. As Saint



Augustine says: "God keeps for us what he does not wish to give us at once, so that we may learn greatly to desire great things." Saint Bernard also expresses a thought which is most consoling to souls eager for perfection: "A diligent care and continual effort toward perfection is reputed as perfection," he says; "and if thus to aspire after perfection with great fervor is, in a sense, to be perfect, likewise, failing to advance is falling back."

It is therefore in order to stimulate our desire that God delays its accomplishment, and so that, having obtained what we want, we may prize it higher, and preserve it with more solicitude and care. "Holy desires," Saint Gregory tells us, "are increased by this delay; and if, on account of it they should become tepid, then they are not true desires." It is also that we may clearly recognize our weakness so that, having acquired some degree of perfection, we may know that it is to a pure grace of God and not to any industry on our part that it is due. Saint Chrysostom adds still another reason. He says that many times God does not grant our prayer immediately, wishing to bring it about thereby that we should approach him more often, importuning him by our prayers, and that by this means we may enjoy his bounty more fully and unite ourselves to him more closely in love.

Dear Padre

FEBRUARY 11, 2018

Why is church often packed on Ash Wednesday, even though it is not a holy day of obligation?

Indeed, pastoral experience corroborates your observation. Holy days of obligation draw well—but it's standing-room only on Ash Wednesday. There's something undeniably elemental about the ugly smudge of ashes on the forehead. People wear it without embarrassment or shame. It is as if to say, "I'm Catholic and proud of it."

Ash Wednesday is unique because it signals the beginning of Lent, the Church's special time of confession and renewal in preparation for Easter. It is what Christians are all about—people who have died with Christ in the waters of baptism in order to rise with him to a new life. We renew our baptismal commitment to be his people in the world. As we recall and celebrate Christ's passage through death to life, we renew our own death to old sinful ways to rise and live with recaptured vigor.

The symbols of Ash Wednesday touch us powerfully. When we hear, "Remember, you are dust and to dust you shall return," we are reminded of our vulnerability and dependence on God. Despite our mechanisms of power, ultimately, like dust in the wind, we can be whisked away in an instant and brought to our knees.

At the same time, we are called to scale the spiritual heights to turn away from sin and be faithful to the gospel, affirming that we are a people with an enduring destiny and a sacred mission in the world. Together we get our ashes and turn back to the Lord.

Leprosy was a highly contagious skin disease that led to certain death for anyone who caught it in Jesus' time. For good reason the Jewish law demanded that a leper live set apart and scream out as he walked along to keep everyone at a safe distance. Imagine the pitiful scene of everyone discreetly but purposefully moving away at the sound of someone screaming, "Unclean, unclean!"

Yet the leper doesn't scream to keep Jesus away. He walks right up to our Lord and confesses his faith in Jesus' power to heal him of this incurable bacteria. He humbly admits his contagious illness and places himself before Jesus. And unlike anyone else might do, Jesus doesn't run away, he walks toward him. He does the unthinkable. He touches him!

We need not be ashamed of our deadly sin that eats away at our heart and cripples our ability to love. Go to Jesus, expose it to him, and let his loving touch transform you.

The terrible disease of leprosy was still a major problem well into the nineteenth century when St. Damian, a Belgian missionary, went to the Hawaiian Island of Molokai to serve as parish priest to all the lepers quarantined on that island. Not fearing to touch them, he cared for them for many years until, as expected, he contracted the disease and died of it.

This is what it means to be a Christian! Be like Jesus. Be not afraid of your wounds or those of others, no matter how repellent, and give of yourself to care for them.
