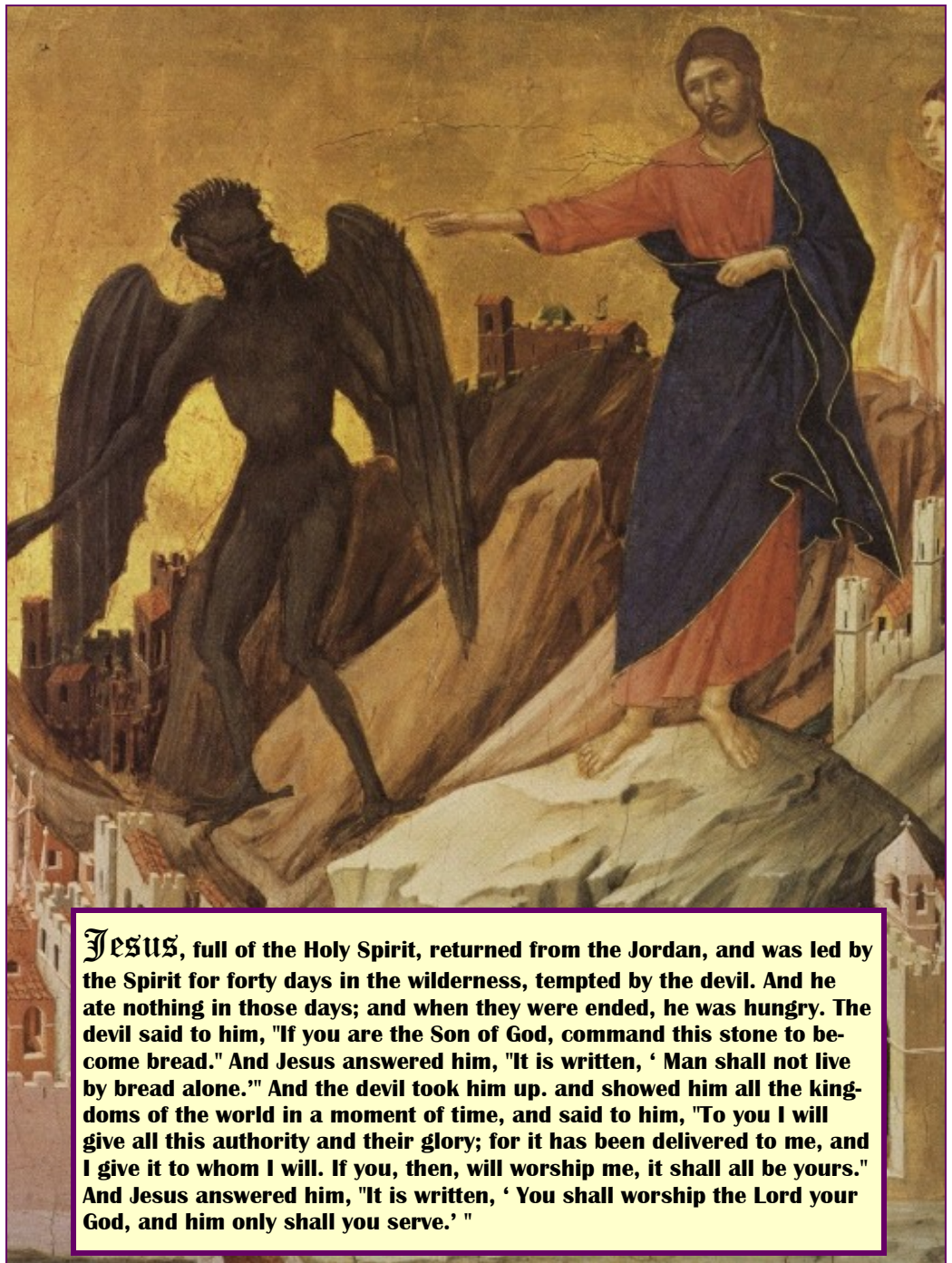

The Word From Father Thomas

First Sunday of Lent



And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

The heaven and earth are two different spheres, separate and distinct from one another. This is presumed to be the divine-human condition in which all participate.

Jesus comes out of the depths of water, leaving behind sin, what separates the divine and the human. His emergence is an act of human reaching, an ascending openness. He finds the heaven torn apart, not for a moment, but permanently. "God has ripped the heavens apart irrevocably at the baptism of Jesus, never to shut again. Through this gracious gash in the universe, he has poured forth his Spirit into the earthly realm" (J. Marcus, in Francis J. Moloney, *The Gospel of Mark: A Commentary*). This "gracious gash" allows the Spirit of love to descend. But the Spirit does not merely descend "on" him; it descends "into" him, fully inhabiting his being and preparing him for his mission. The reaching human is met by reaching divine; ascending human is met by descending Divine. A new divine - human condition is revealed.

This spiritual union between the divine and human in Jesus does not erupt into an individual celebration. Instead Jesus is driven into the wilderness for forty days, an allusion to the trials of Israel as they tried and largely failed to be faithful to the God of their liberation. The baptismal gift is not a personal privilege but the foundation for a struggle. This wilderness will be a place and time of testing and conflict.

The testing and conflict will be conducted by Satan, the Adversary. Satan is associated with wild beasts, symbols of the violent reprisals that will afflict Jesus if he pursues the path of uniting God and creation. Satan is not one more character. Satan is the inner, invisible energy of people, groups, and social and political structures that inflict suffering on people. This adversary of God manifests itself through these people, groups and social and political structures and turns them into "wild beasts" who devour God's good creation. This inner invisible force of Satan and the demons will quickly sense Jesus' opposition and move against him. They know who Jesus is because he is their polar opposite. As their polar opposite, Jesus threatens their possessions and seeks the territory they inhabit. Satan and demons actively keep people alienated from God and divided among themselves. Jesus actively seeks to unite people to God and to one another. These two are irreconcilable.

Jesus not only preaches the kingdom; he is the kingdom in himself. His baptismal experience structures his consciousness. He is sustained by divine love and suffused by divine pleasure. His life in time is permeated by eternity. Therefore time is fulfilled. The promise of union that lurks in every moment has happened. But it has happened in the one human being, Jesus. It has yet to happen in others – in us. Jesus' mission is to offer to others that potential that has become actual in himself. This offer makes the kingdom of God near.

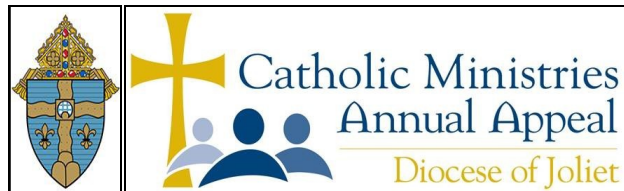

Why won't the priest hear my confession right before Mass?

Theoretically, any time is a good time for penitents to reconcile and renew their relationship with the Lord! In practice, the priest's refusal to hear your confession immediately before presiding at Mass may be as much for your benefit as his. In his preoccupation with last-minute details of leading the assembly, he may think: *"How can I be more attentive to this individual and to a worthy celebration of the sacrament of penance without delaying Mass?"* He might also be reacting to a penitent's mechanical understanding of the sacrament that fosters a scrupulous practice of devotional confessions—that is, confessing only minor sins in preparation for Communion.

Anyone who is conscious of serious sin is not to "receive the body of the Lord without previous sacramental confession unless there is a grave reason and there is no opportunity to confess" (*Code of Canon Law*, 916). In this case, the person makes a sincere act of contrition, including a resolution to confess as soon as possible. "The Eucharist is not ordered to the forgiveness of mortal sins—that is proper to the sacrament of Reconciliation" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1395). Nevertheless, "the Eucharist strengthens our charity...and this living charity wipes away venial sins [and] the Eucharist preserves us from future mortal sins" (CCC 1394–95).

Catholics in a state of grace show respect for the dignity of the Eucharist, but trying to confess grave sins to a priest right before Mass may lessen the dignity given to one sacrament over another if the celebration of the sacrament of penance is rushed or the celebration of Mass begins late.

Good News!

Like Noah being prepared to navigate the Flood, so the Spirit sent Jesus into the desert. Why was he sent there? Did he need to learn something he didn't know? Did he lack something he needed? Jesus as God didn't lack anything, of course, but he needed time to pray, reflect, and prepare for his mission. He also wanted to set an example to follow. Another Scripture says he went into the desert to be tempted by the devil. That time of spiritual combat was helpful for him.

We also need to go through trials and crises to grow both in our spiritual lives and human maturity. We each have had our desert where we are challenged to our core and stretched beyond our limits. Perhaps it was a crisis such as a health, employment, or relational issue. But it doesn't always have to be such a dramatic event. It can be as simple and constant as the prolonged embracing of daily challenges in a manner that leads to life. We probably look back and see these as some of our best times—if we truly encountered ourselves and our Lord.

The key is in peaceful acceptance, looking for what good can be learned from these inconveniences. In every cross there is a resurrection; in every storm a rainbow assures us of God's presence and victory. It tells us that clouds and storms will not lead to total death, but rather to a purified rebirth, growth, and newfound life and strength. He has promised us this.
