

# The Word From Father Thomas

#### **Second Sunday of Easter**

Thomas, (who is called the Twin), was not present when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side. I will not believe."



The other disciples bear witness to what they have seen, but it is not enough for Thomas. Taking the word of another does not suffice. He has his own criteria for believing, and community attestation is not among them. He wants to probe the marks of Jesus' death. The only way he will see the Lord is if he enters into the wounds. But these wounds are not available for his intrusive probing. These wounds are ones that Jesus shows to people so they may receive God's life and realize his identity. The criteria for knowing the ultimate truth about Jesus are the same after his death as before his death. The person must go beyond the physical level and open himself or herself to the communication of divine life and recognize Jesus as God's incarnate presence. This is spiritual knowledge; the type of knowledge most people think is too subtle and evasive.

A week later his disciples were again in the house and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."

This time Thomas is present. More importantly, Thomas is with the other disciples. He is part of the community, and it is as part of the community that he will experience the risen Lord.

Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus invited Thomas into his wounds, into the correct understanding of his death and through that understanding into the reception of divine life. Although Jesus uses words similar to what Thomas said - which was essential for him to believe - his is not complying with Thomas' demands. The meaning is quite different. Jesus is encouraging Thomas to reach for the divine life that flows through him. Jesus is asking Thomas to reach out and live forever. Thomas' cry, "My Lord and my God," signals both the reception of divine life and the recognition that Jesus and the Father are one.

Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me?

The answer to the question is no. Thomas did not come to faith through physical sight. Thomas came to belief by spiritually grasping the meaning of Jesus' death and, through that understanding; he received the divine life that is stronger than death. He expressed and communicated this experience by exclaiming Jesus as *his* Lord and *his* God, the one who "took him to himself" and in the process took him into God. This experience is available within the community of disciples who gather each week and who find that Jesus is among them offering them the life that flows through his open wounds. It is not necessary to physically see him in the flesh. Even those like Thomas who saw him in the flesh in his pre-Easter days only understood him and believed when they contacted his spiritual presence within the believing community. This experience of risen Lord is not relegated to the past. It is present and available when the disciples gather "next week."

# Dear Padre

April 8, 2018

When our priest raises the host during the consecration at Mass, a parishioner says out loud, "My Lord and my God!" Am I out of line to feel this isn't right?

The liturgical assembly at Mass isn't a random collection of individuals; rather, the faithful form a holy people to give thanks to God. "They are consequently to avoid any appearance of singularity or division.... This unity is beautifully apparent from the gestures and bodily postures observed together by the faithful" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 95–96). Moreover, unity is achieved in the vocal prayers and responses at Mass, "that, gathered into one body by the Holy Spirit," we "may truly become a living sacrifice in Christ" (Eucharistic Prayer IV).

The Eucharistic Prayer—the preeminent prayer of the Church—is voiced by the priest on everyone's behalf. All participate in the collective prayer by our acclamations throughout: the dialogue preface, Sanctus, memorial, and great amen. Here we express our belief in the mystery of faith and our unity in the Church's prayer.

The revised *Roman Missal* omitted the memorial acclamation, "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again," because there's no equivalent text in the original Latin and also because it's more of a proclamation of faith than a prayer.

Likewise, "My Lord and my God" is a proclamation of faith that may be for some an entirely appropriate response for a believer as the host is raised, but the Church provides three communal prayers as acclamations immediately following the consecration. Any personal expression should be said quietly to preserve the unity of the Mass.

# Good News!

April 8, 2018 Second Sunday of Easter (B) Acts 4:32–35; 1 Jn 5:1–6; Jn 20:19–31

The painting The Embrace, by Pedro Cano, is a powerful image of paternal love and union. It recalls the historic moment when St. John Paul II, at the Mass of his elevation to the papacy, embraced his lifelong mentor, Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński. The painting is a moment frozen in time that represents something much bigger than the event that inspired it.

The two figures are barely distinguishable. They seem to be fused, like two figures carved out of one piece of marble. It is the mutual love of giving and receiving that makes this exchange so moving. Indeed, it reminds us of the embrace of love we seek in this life from our loved ones as well as in eternal life. There is no distance between them, rancor, or questioning—only the total happiness of being united with a friend.

The pope's strong, broad shoulders are penetrated by the grasping hands of the one embraced. There is a clenching need to find security in the other. We all search for love, forgiveness, and for strength we do not find in ourselves. We wish our faith were stronger but, the truth is, we need to be constantly turning to God for his mercy.

Yet, he is pleased to be our rock upon which we lean, the one we can touch in our doubt. Turn to him in need, for he is happy to save you from the trials of this life. He wants to be the risen one who restores our faith. He rejoices that we need him and return to him.
