

The Word From Father Thomas

THIS IS MY BODY, THIS IS MY BLOOD

In order that we may become of his Body, not in desire only, but also in very fact, let us become commingled with that Body. This, in truth, takes place by means of the food which he has given us as a gift, because he desired to prove the love which he has for us. It is for this reason that he has shared himself with us and has brought his Body down to our level, namely, that we might be one with him as the body is joined with the head. This, in truth, is characteristic of those who greatly love....

Moreover, Christ has done even this to spur us on to greater love. And to show the love he has for us he has made it possible for those who desire, not merely to look upon him, but even to touch him and to consume him and to fix their teeth in his Flesh and to be commingled with him; in short, to fulfill all their love. Let us, then come back from that table like lions breathing out fire, thus becoming terrifying to the devil, and remaining mindful of our Head and of the love which he has shown for us...

The Blood which we receive by way of food is not immediately a source of nourishment, but goes through some other stage first; this is not so with this Blood, for it at once refreshes the soul and instills a certain great power in it. This Blood when worthily received, drives away demons and puts them at a distance from us, and even summons to us angels and the Lord of angels. Where they see the Blood of the Lord, demons flee, while angels gather. This Blood, poured out in abundance, has washed the whole world clean.

How strange and wonderful is the Catholic Faith! The Buddha offers his wise teaching to his followers. Muhammad presents to his devotees a revelation that was given to him. Confucius passes on to his adepts an intricate moral system that he had developed. Moses comes down the mountain bearing a Law that he had received from on high.

But Jesus presents, offers, bears, and passes on...his very self. On the night before he suffered, he gathered at the Passover table with his Twelve Apostles. Taking bread in his hands, he said, *This is my body*, and lifting the cup, said, *This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many*. He gave them, not a teaching, a discipline, or a spiritual insight, but his substance. And this is why the Christian Faith is not a matter, primarily, of learning or walking a religious path, but of eating and drinking Jesus; Body and Blood But whereas, in the ordinary course of things, food and drink are assimilated by the one who consumes them, in this unique case the one who consumes assimilated by what he or she consumes.

From this Eucharistic fact, the Church Fathers derived the splendid teaching of *theiosis* or deification. We disciples do not just follow Jesus; we become Jesus, participants through grace of what he is by nature, adopted sons and daughters in the Son. This doctrine, both poetically evocative and metaphysically exact, is the object of our bedazzled contemplation on this Solemnity of the Lord's Body and Blood.

What is the Catholic belief in the Real Presence of the Eucharist?

Our belief in the Real Presence goes back to Jesus himself. Saint Paul describes the Last Supper: Jesus took bread and said, "This is my body." He took wine and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood." The Catholic Church has always believed that Jesus meant exactly what he said.

When confronted, Jesus did not water down his statements, although they were difficult to accept and beyond human understanding. Even Peter did not claim to understand. He simply accepted them on the authority of Jesus, who had "the words of eternal life."

Catholics have always believed in the Real Presence of Jesus, known traditionally as transubstantiation. This means that the "substance" of the bread and wine becomes the "substance" of Christ's Body and Blood, while the appearances of bread and wine remain. When we receive Communion, we truly receive the Body and Blood, soul and divinity, of Christ, under the appearance of bread and wine (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1373–1381).

Not all Christians believe in the Eucharist as Catholics do. Some deny that Christ is present at all, contending that the bread and wine only symbolize the spirit and teachings of Jesus. There are many variations, and Catholics should carefully distinguish our Church's teaching from other opinions.

Bread and wine are changed by Christ into himself in a miracle of love we Catholics call, with awe and affection, the Blessed Sacrament.

Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (B)
Ex 24:3-8; Heb 9:11-15; Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

A beautiful painting by Giovanni Bellini shows the great care and reverence with which Joseph, Nicodemus, and Mary Magdalene place the body of Christ in the tomb. Yet it is also a symbol of the delicacy and devotion with which we should receive Jesus, who comes down to us on the altar at Mass.

His Body and Blood were shed to create a New Covenant, a new pact of love between God and people. In the Old Testament, God ordered that the blood of sacrificed animals be sprinkled on the people as a way to seal a pact with him, thus gaining forgiveness of their sins. As if to say, may I be as this calf or goat if I ever fail to obey and live up to your commands.

In the New Covenant, God sent his own Son to be the sacrificial victim to seal our covenant of love with the Father. Before the blood was sprinkled, we consume his Body and Blood in the Eucharist as Jesus commanded: Do this in memory of me. Take this, all of you, and eat. Take this, all of you, and erink. If goat blood could express a covenant in the Old Testament, how much more powerful to unite us with God is the blood of his only begotten Son! How much more powerful to forgive us and communicate God's overpowering love!

Jesus lays down his life sacramentally again in this Mass. Let us receive his Body and Blood with purity and devotion, aware of the amazing gift and the miracle that happens in our presence.
