

January 23, 2022 Third Sunday of Ordinary Time



Lc 4:16-20a Into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord." Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him.

Names are powerful, and no name is more powerful than the Name Jesus



Saint Bernardine of Siena, an electrifying Franciscan preacher of the early fifteenth century, was the saint who most spread devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. He skillfully depicted The Holy Name of Jesus with the well-known monogram "IHS," derived from the Greek letters forming the word "Jesus." In the sixteenth century, the Jesuits built on this tradition and utilized the "IHS" to embellish their churches, even making it the emblem of their Society. The mother church of all Jesuit churches, in Rome, is officially named in honor of The Most Holy Name of Jesus, although its name is commonly shortened to simply "The Jesus." There is raw power in the name Jesus. It makes polite company cringe. It divides families. It floats across the dinner table, letting everyone know exactly where you stand. A comfortable, vague euphemism like "the man upstairs" or "the big guy" just won't do. "Jesus" does not convey an idea that everyone can interpret as they wish. It's someone's name. And that someone taught, suffered, died, rose from the dead, ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father in heaven.

January 23, 2022 Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) Neh 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10; 1 Cor 12:12-30 or 12:12-14, 27; Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21

Fulfilled in Your Hearing. When we hear that phrase, we might be inclined to think of prophecy. However, today's readings suggest something a bit different. True, in today's Gospel, Jesus states that he is the fulfillment of the promise made by the prophet Isaiah. However, the way that passage was fulfilled by Jesus was not the way his hearers expected. The passage seems to promise a change in society where there will be no more poor or prisoners. The people expected a political change which would overthrow Roman control. Jesus' application was quite different. The fulfillment of that prophecy included a new and often radical way of understanding society. In other words, Jesus revealed the true meaning of the prophecy.

Such reapplication is even clearer in the first reading. Nehemiah, the Jewish leader of those who had returned from Babylonian exile, gathered all the community together, read the Law, and then reapplied it for them.

Reapplication is often necessary because what might have been a helpful way of understanding something in our faith under some circumstances might be impractical, even inappropriate, in others. For example, to pray for an end to war is important, but to do nothing to work for peace changes how we understand prayer. Circumstances often change as we go through life. Reapplication of our faith acknowledges this and searches for ways that faith can continue to address those changing circumstances. Faithful reapplication always keeps our religious tradition alive and meaningful.

Equality Begins in the Womb." Roe V. Wade

The legalization for women to have an Abortion. What is an Abortion? The deliberate termination of a human pregnancy. Abortion is when a pregnancy is ended so that it doesn't result in the birth of a child. The expulsion of a fetus from a woman's uterus. The termination of a pregnancy resulting in, or closely followed by the death of the embryo or fetus (Baby): *Pray, Pray, Pray for the Killing to STOP!*



8 weeks Fingers and toes. Your baby has fingers and toes now – and they're webbed! Her hands are flexed at the wrist and meet over her heart. She now has knees, and her legs may be long enough that her feet meet in front of her body. Getting ready to breathe. Your baby's respiratory system is forming.



16 weeks—Your baby is now constantly doubling up in size and weight. Your baby has gotten so big that its tiny heart is pumping about 6.6 gal (25 l) of blood daily, and this quantity will only keep increasing. In the womb, your baby at 16 weeks has complete mobility in limbs and joints



24 weeks—The Baby now weighs about 1.4 pounds now. It responds to sounds by moving or increasing its pulse. You many notice jerking motions if Baby has hiccups. With the inner ear full developed, Baby may be able to sense being upside down in the womb.

Jane Roe- In 1969, Norma McCorvey, a <u>Texas</u> woman in her early 20s, sought to terminate an unwanted pregnancy. In court documents, McCorvey became known as "Jane Roe."

Henry Wade- Was the attorney who filed a lawsuit on behalf of McCorvey (Jane Roe) and all the other women "who might become pregnant and want to consider all options Henry Wade, the district attorney of Dallas County, where McCorvey lived. Meanwhile, McCovey (Jane Roe) gave birth and put the child up for adoption. Jeanne Mancini, President of the March for Life Education and Defense Fund stressed the need to end discrimination against the most vulnerable human beings — those still in the womb.

"From our nation's birth, our founders recognized the dignity inherent to all people, making each one of us equal in our right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," she wrote. "Because of this, Americans have fought for centuries to advance equality for every person, regardless of race, sex, or disability status. It has taken centuries, but discrimination is now acknowledged as unacceptable just about everywhere in America. Everywhere, that is, except in the womb."
